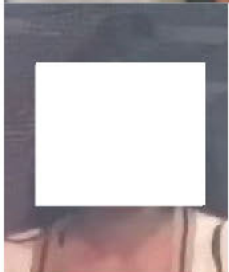

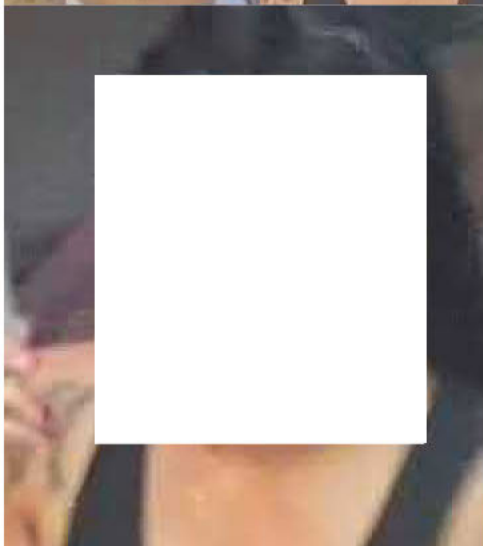
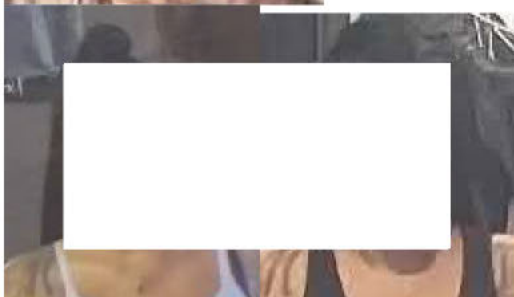
Hi Patrick,

We appear to have video of the victim from both the 26th and 27th. The last footage I've found so far of that night was from around 10/27/2025 @ 02:04am, when the victim was walking on the 600 Block of Bourbon with a black female/ possible trans with long hair/ wig (see attached video). While the victim appeared to have a drink in his hand, he appeared to have reasonably good motor control and did not appear overly impaired.

I took the liberty of analyzing additional footage of the female this past month, whereby her behaviour appears consistent with 14:82. In case possibly relevant, I've attached what appear to be additional photos of the female from previous nights this month.

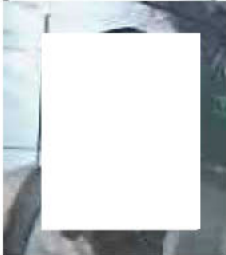
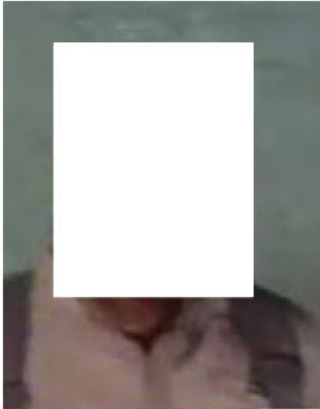

WWL-TV just reached out to me about wanting to do a story on Project NOLA's new vehicle intrusion detection system that will soon begin to automatically alert the 8th District when a vehicle is driven along closed sections of Bourbon Street at night, and I wanted to make sure that both of y'all were aware of our progress.

In response to major issues involving vehicles being able to travel along Bourbon Street at night through dense crowds, Project NOLA developed a new vehicle intrusion

detection system utilizing its existing network of crime cameras along Bourbon Street that may instantly send a notification to the camera monitoring station within the 8th District's Promenade Office. After 1/12/26 or assurances are made that the NOPD will no longer wrongfully provide Project NOLA's footage to TV production companies for commercial/ entertainment purposes, Project NOLA will be able to automatically push Bourbon Street Vehicle Intrusion tips directly to officers' cell phones via its mobile app in real-time.

Presently, our new vehicle intrusion detection system covers about 70% of Bourbon Street, between Canal and St. Ann. However, as our existing network of cameras along Bourbon are prioritized to zoom in on pedestrians to scan faces, we're presently working with the business community to get more AI-enabled cameras along Bourbon that would be dedicated to better detect intruding vehicles. Additionally, the new 180-degree 4k UHD cameras may also alert officers when someone parks their vehicle on Bourbon just before the street is closed to vehicular traffic, help officers more quickly determine the number of shots fired and number of firearms used during a shooting incident (thanks to gunshot detection mics on each camera), and will help visually track the movements of perpetrators on Bourbon. You may wish to note that the new vehicle intrusion cameras will *not* feature Live Facial Recognition.

Needless to say, there is no cost to the City or NOPD, as Project NOLA's new vehicle intrusion system is being underwritten via charitable donations from area residents and business owners. Thanks for reaching out. First, I would like to start with the obvious that NOPD officers cannot edit or add to Project NOLA's Facial Recognition database or run searches.

Project NOLA first proactively used Facial Recognition in New Orleans around 9/11/2022, after seeing a publicized NOPD BOLO that led to our successfully helping the NOPD identify and locate a suspect wanted under item I- -22. At the time, NOPD Chief Ferguson was quickly made aware of Project NOLA's first use of Facial Recognition to help catch a wanted subject. However, I believe the first in-person review of our new technology by an NOPD Chief was on 11/17/2023, when Chief Kirkpatrick visited our RTCC at UNO to discuss Project NOLA's Facial Recognition capabilities. You may find this a bit confusing as Chief Kirkpatrick told reporters earlier this year that she had just learned of Project NOLA's Live Facial Recognition capabilities around April of 2025, but emails between Chief Kirkpatrick and myself during 11/2023 clearly evidence otherwise.

As Project NOLA does not get involved with non-criminal administrative matters involving police officers, I'll need to respectfully decline being formally interviewed in the matter. I believe the emails you've reviewed between officers and myself evidence that neither City Code or NOPD Policy have been violated, but welcome you to reach out regarding any questions you may have regarding our Facial Recognition technology and

the methods Project NOLA uses to proactively assist the NOPD. We would also appreciate any concerns or suggestions you may have to offer regarding Project NOLA's use of Facial Recognition.

Anne and Sam,

WWL-TV just reached out to me about wanting to do a story on Project NOLA's new vehicle intrusion detection system that will soon begin to automatically alert the 8th District when a vehicle is driven along closed sections of Bourbon Street at night, and I wanted to make sure that both of y'all were aware of our progress.

In response to major issues involving vehicles being able to travel along Bourbon Street at night through dense crowds, Project NOLA developed a new vehicle intrusion detection system utilizing its existing network of crime cameras along Bourbon Street that may instantly send a notification to the camera monitoring station within the 8th District's Promenade Office. After 1/12/26 or assurances are made that the NOPD will no longer wrongfully provide Project NOLA's footage to TV production companies for commercial/entertainment purposes, Project NOLA will be able to automatically push Bourbon Street Vehicle Intrusion tips directly to officers' cell phones via its mobile app in real-time.

Presently, our new vehicle intrusion detection system covers about 70% of Bourbon Street, between Canal and St. Ann. However, as our existing network of cameras along Bourbon are prioritized to zoom in on pedestrians to scan faces, we're presently working with the business community to get more AI-enabled cameras along Bourbon that would be dedicated to better detect intruding vehicles. Additionally, the new 180-degree 4k UHD cameras may also alert officers when someone parks their vehicle on Bourbon just before

the street is closed to vehicular traffic, help officers more quickly determine the number of shots fired and number of firearms used during a shooting incident (thanks to gunshot detection mics on each camera), and will help visually track the movements of perpetrators on Bourbon. You may wish to note that the new vehicle intrusion cameras will *not* feature Live Facial Recognition.

Needless to say, there is no cost to the City or NOPD, as Project NOLA's new vehicle intrusion system is being underwritten via charitable donations from area residents and business owners. I hope this email adds to your having a great day. Please let me know should you have any questions, concerns or suggestions.
